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Reading Maurice Trace's interesting article on "Picadilly" in your most recent issue, prompts me to write of the time in the early thirties, when I knew one of the stars of that film - Anna May Wong.

It was one evening in 1934 when I was confortably settled in a first class diner en route for Liverpool (one could afford to go "1st" in those days) where I was going on a business journey, that just before the train left Euston, the Guard staggered in with several smart white suitcases and put them on the rack opposite my seat. This rather amnoyed me as I had been looking forward to putting my feet up on the empty seat after a good meal and relaxing in comfort for the rest of the journey.

However, immediately after the luggage, a most attractive young woman came and sat down directly opposite whom I had no difficulty at all in recognising as Miss Wong. Perhaps I ought to mention here that Anna May had long been a schoolboy pin-up of mine, ever since I had seen her in that famous "oldie" with the original Douglas Fairbanks - "The Thief of Bagdad" - so I was already acquainted with the lady's charms to some extent.

After dinner her eyes closed and, as far as I could tell she fell asleep. This was the chance I had been waiting for. I used to paint and draw a bit them and after summoning the steward to ask for a supply of paper, I began to make various sketches of my attractive neighbour's features. She woke before I had finished the drawings and made me promise to send her the completed picture when ready - which I later did do.

At Liverpool, my taxi drew up at the same well known hotel as Miss Wong's, we happened to go up in the same lift to the first floor and both went to our respective rooms - she to what I afterwards found to be a V.I.P. suite, and me being of humbler means, to a single with bath.

That evening the local papers carried advertisements of the Empire Theatre extolling the virtues of "Anna May Wong, the famous film star" who was appearing in person for one week only. This gave me another idea? Why not make a movie of her stage show?

I had no camera with me and being unable to beg, borrow or hire a 9.5 one, I regrettably had to hire an old B & H 16mm camera from a shop in Lord Street. This was loaded with fast black and white stock and the following evening saw me seated in the front row of the stalls with camera at the ready.

Incidentally, all the stalls were sold out for that week so I had to appeal to the star herself, who soon fixed me up with a good seat.

During the filming, the motor made such a noise that I was almost in danger of being thrown out and Miss Wong herself afterwards told me how disconcerting it had been, especially during her singing. However, luckily the whole 100 feet came out remarkably well when one considers that only the stage lights were in use, and I have the original film to this day, together with a copy on 9.5. Anna May herself was pleased with the result and insisted that I should let her have a copy, which I was glad to do - together with the finished portrait made from my sketches, with which she seemed equally pleasantly surprised.

In conclusion, let me say that after getting to know her better, I formed a very high opinion of Anna May Wong as a person and had great respect and admiration for her, for she possessed talent and brains as well as beauty. Alas, she died a few years ago at a comparatively young age, and there must be many of use elderly folk who will never forget her.

I was very interested in Mr D E Mason's letter about 9.5 equipment and the future position of the gauge. It certainly does cover the big problem of 9.5mm.

What is being done to get new recruits? Mr Mason asks. I think the answer is nothing, so where do we start?

With money? If we want new recruits we then need money to get them. Where do we get the money? Certainly not from Group 9.5. They loose some 60/80 members every year, fortunately kept made up by new members. Many drop out because of the large cost of membership fee of £2 and this goes up rather than comes down. The news letters takes the place of the magazine in order to keep the cost in printing down, but we would all prefer a magazine to a news letter, so there is no money there. But we do have members, Good Members, and Very Good Members, like you, Mr Mason.

A few years ago, Mr John Hall and I could see that there would be difficulties about future 9.5mm film supplies, so we formed the Amateur Film Co. A meeting was held at Mr Hall's house. Ken Valentine, Ken Finch, Jack Smith and Pat Flynn all put money into this venture. A duplicated letter was put into the 9.5 magazine asking those who were concerned for the future of 9.5 (and certainly today, Mr Mason is one of those) to join us, not a single member (or non-member) replied to our request or offered to support our quest for capital, for film cannot be paid for with shirt buttons. Fair enough, the 9.5mm amateur had made his point. So Mr Mason, there is no money to be had there. What next? Please do not say "Social Security". It is only by our own efforts will we get new

recruits. We could visit clubs with our equipment and show the flag, (on second thoughts, this might be a bad idea) - I remember a very keen member taking along a pre-war projector (not fully in working order due to lack of spares) to a club to show the flag and the visit was not the greatest success ever recorded. As the member said, "We need new equipment". How many members have new equipment they could use? And by new, I mean less than five years old, since design and manufacture, that is.

Mr Mason asks for regular items in magazines like "Movie Maker". Good, but what do we write about? New equipment? Or give news about Pathe Equipment, now more than 25 years old? Or would this be history and not news? What new equipment is there to fill 12 articles in a monthly magazine, or 52 articles in a weekly magazine? I am at a loss, but the idea is good.

If we had money we could go on tele or roadside hoardings or national dailies. So we come back to the root of all evil. Any grey haired ailing 60 year olds good at robbing banks?
